THE FORESTRY ACT

**THE FORESTRY REGULATIONS, MADE UNDER SECTION 13 OF THE
FORESTRY ACT.**

1. SHORT TITLE. These Regulations may be cited as the Forestry Regulations.

2. CLEARING OF LAND AND CUTTING OF TIMBER &c. (1) An application for a permit to clear land for cultivation, pasturage or any other purpose, or to cut, lop or fell any timber within a Forest Reserve shall be made to the Chief Forest Officer in writing in the form A as set out in the Schedule,

and when not made by the owner of the area concerned the approval of the owner or his representative shall be endorsed thereon.

(2) The Chief Forest Officer upon consideration of such restrictions and upon such conditions as he may think fit to impose, and such permit shall be in form B as set out in the Schedule.

3. FOREST FIRES. No person shall for any purpose whatsoever set or cause to be set any fire within a Forest Reserve without having first obtained a permit so to do from the Chief Forest Officer.

4. OTHER DAMAGE TO TREES, &c. No person shall within any forest Reserve uproot any tree or remove any portion of the bark or in any other way cause damage to any tree or plant without having first obtained a permit so to do from the Chief Forest Officer.

5. GRAZING OF STOCK ON LAND DECLARED TO BE A FOREST RESERVE. (1) No person shall tether any animal within a Forest Reserve declared as such under section 10 of the Forestry Act.

(2) The Chief Forest Officer shall have power impound and to authorize the impounding of all animals found within such Forest Reserve and also to exercise within such forest reserve the right given to the proprietor, possessor, or other person in charge of any estate or other land, or any authorized person under section 23 of the Cattle Trespass Act, to shoot any cattle or feathered stock found trespassing thereon.

6. BURNING OF WOOD FOR CHARCOAL. (1) Any application for permit to burn wood for charcoal within a Forest Reserve shall be made to the Chief Forest Officer in writing in form C as set out in the Schedule.

(2) The Chief Forest Officer upon consideration of such application may grant a permit setting out the locality where the wood is to be burnt, and may impose such restrictions and conditions as he may think fit, and such permit shall be in form D as set out in the Schedule.

7. REFUSAL OF GRANT OF PERMITS. In case where a permit is refused by the Chief Forest Officer the applicant may appeal to the Minister whose decision shall be final.

8. REGISTER OF APPLICATIONS AND PERMITS. The Chief Forest Officer shall keep a Register of all applications received and all permits granted or refused. Where an application has been refused the reason for refusal shall be noted in the Register.

9. SURVEYS AND DEMARCATION. (1) Any area declared to be a Forest Reserve under section 10 of the Forestry Act, shall be surveyed and the Surveyor shall prepare plans giving the acreage and the boundaries of the Reserve.

(2) The boundaries of every such Reserve shall be demarcated by concrete pillars, stone cairns, painted posts or such signs as may be determined by the Chief Forest Officer, set at distances of 100 yards apart except irregularities in the outline make it necessary to have these boundary marks at closer intervals.

10. PENALTY. If any person acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, any of the requirements of regulations 3, 4, or 5 (1) he shall be guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars.
